PILOT PROJECT

This conference serves as a pilot project constructing the backbone for a later conference. The chief aim of the project, *Reformation theology and its impact on world societies after 500 years (1571-2017)*, is to offer new approaches to the important question of the impact of the Reformed world and life view upon modern society and the mentality by investigating:

- (1) how key ideas in Reformed theology can be seen as implicating a kind of social teaching
- (2) to what extent social teachings inherent in Reformed theology form the background of religious and social institutions, especially socio-economical and political structures, during the formative period between the Reformation and the modern and post-modern periods
- (3) by combining theological and historical perspectives this project aims to offer important new insights into the shaping of the European and especially the South African society during the last

two centuries

(4) the project also aims at establishing a firm foundation for a further discussion of the role of the Reformation for modern self-understanding and politics

The project will mainly focus on perspectives from the Reformed Reformation (Calvin) – causes, issues and effects – but also on the great influence which Augustine had on Calvin.
